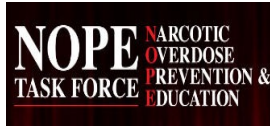

Clifton Heights

From Mayor Joseph T. Kelly Jr. in cooperation with the Clifton Heights Police Department, we invite all residents to attend this Town Hall Meeting.

The entire nation is in the midst of a heroin and opioid epidemic and Delaware County has not been excluded. Each year, more Americans die from drug overdoses than in traffic accidents, and more than three out of five of these deaths involve an opioid. In Delaware County alone there were 227 total drug related deaths in 2016. Our local area residents have not been spared from this tragedy, and we need to make a difference through education and assistance.

In cooperation between Mayor Joseph T. Kelly Jr., members of Clifton Heights Borough Council, the Clifton Heights Police Department and various county and state officials with the goal to address this growing concern, the entire community is invited to attend an **Opioid Awareness Town Hall Meeting on Wednesday, May 10th starting at 6:00 pm**. Parents, students, community leaders and residents are all encouraged to join in the discussion at the Clifton Heights Fire Company Hall located at 20 W. Baltimore Avenue in Clifton Heights.

The Town Hall meeting will include an overview of the alarming opioid epidemic that is having devastating impacts on our Delaware County community and will connect residents with resources available for treatment and recovery. With a message of prevention, education, and awareness, the Delaware County NOPE (Narcotics Overdose Prevention & Education) Task Force will provide an informative, interactive presentation about the realities of youth drug abuse and addiction and provide information on the steps we can take as a community to prevent addiction and overdoses.

Hosted by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Clifton Heights, the Clifton Heights Police Department, Delaware County Heroin Task Force, PA State Rep. Jamie Santora and District Attorney Jack Whelan, the open discussion will include experts from the medical, treatment and education communities. Our endeavor is to help our residents see the signs of addiction and provide avenues of education, assistance and the eventual positive outcome that is within our grasp when community and leadership come together to cure this horrific disease.

We hope you will attend and expect that everyone will take away information that will be both helpful and insightful. The Town Hall is free and open to not only the residents of Clifton Heights, but all those who are impacted by this epidemic.
